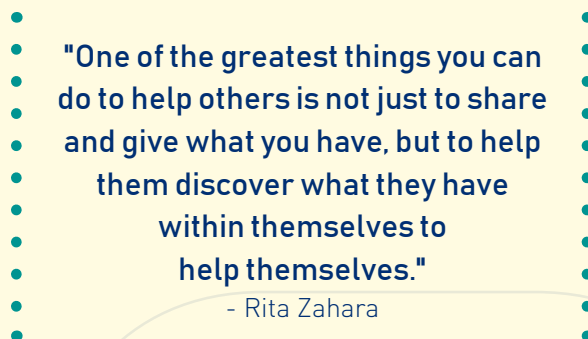

## HOME VISITATION

Home Visitation services have been provided throughout our region for the past 20 years assisting over 1800 families! New parents have looked to us for guidance as they navigate pregnancy and having a newborn at home. Those who have received our free services have benefited from having someone on their side – a cheerleader encouraging them and celebrating victories and milestones.

Goals of the Home Visitation are to:

- promote positive parent-child relationships
- grow parenting knowledge and skills
- foster healthy pregnancies and child development

- help families identify and access formal and informal support and service networks available
- assist in the identification and pursuit of family goals.

### OUR FAMILIES REPORT, AS A RESULT OF THE HOME VISITATION PROGRAM:

- they have increased knowledge on parenting and child development and have learned positive ways to teach their child
- Healthy Families has supported them to work on the goals that the families have chosen and connected them to services that were helpful for them and their families

## HOME VISITATION STORY

Children's Services referred a mother and her children to the HFHF Home Visitation Program. During the home visits, the mother disclosed that her partner was abusing her, and he was addicted to meth, which increased the violent episodes. Using the Family Violence Protocol Screen, the Home Visitor and mother developed a safety plan for her and her children. When the next violent incident occurred, the Home Visitor supported the mother and children by helping her access income supports and provided a referral to Children Services for assistance. The Home Visitor assisted this parent to access Victim Services to obtain an Emergency Protection Order (EPO) to ensure her children's safety.

Currently, this mother and children live in their own residence and are actively involved with formal, ongoing supports. The Home Visitor continues to help this parent realize her goal to build a healthy environment for herself and children while learning to understand the effects of domestic violence. Mother stated, "I would never have come this far without my Home Visitor's support and knowledge of what was available for me and my family". The Home Visitor continues to support Mother and her children on their journey.

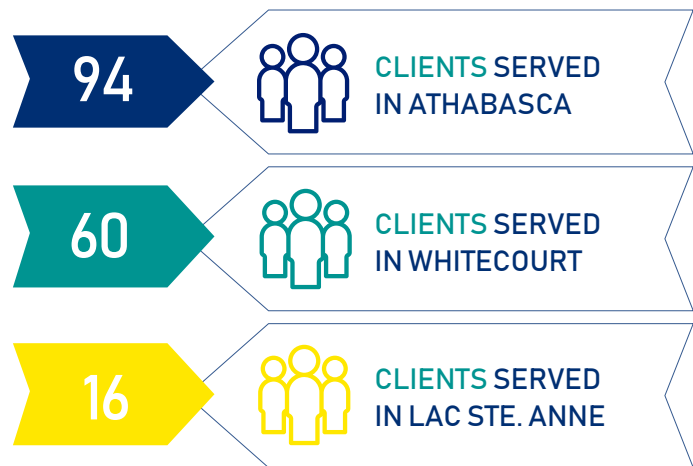

## FASD MENTORSHIP PROGRAM - ATHABASCA, LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY, WESTLOCK & WHITECOURT

FASD Mentors support individuals who have Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) by developing a relationship, providing advocacy, and helping with goal setting. Mentors assist individuals to develop life skills and make healthy decisions.

FASD Mentors have found each individual they support is unique and has areas of both strengths and challenges – although they are sometimes faced with complex difficulties, they show great resilience. Healthy Families Healthy Futures has played a role in the lives of 170 individuals with FASD since the onset of programming in 2008. Our goal is to assist our clients to build and maintain healthy lifestyles including developing life and social skills while strengthening community involvement and support.

HFHF is pleased to announce additional funding from the Northwest Central FASD Network to extend part-time supports to Westlock and increase supports in Lac Ste. Anne County.

## PARENT-CHILD ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (PCAP) ATHABASCA & WHITECOURT

Healthy Families Healthy Futures has been supporting women to reduce or stop alcohol and/or drug use during pregnancy since 2009; focusing on encouraging healthy pregnancies and lives for women and their children. We have played a role in the lives of over 98 families resulting in improved client social and emotional wellbeing, clients' increased positive community experiences and independence, reduced stigmatization and isolation, and reduced stress levels.

PCAP Mentors utilize prevention conversation to increase awareness of FASD and encourage healthy pregnancies and babies. As communities become increasingly informed, with a growing awareness about the work of PCAP, an increased community-level awareness of FASD and reduced stigmatization of client's results

### THE EVIDENCE IS IN

Twenty years of evaluation research has shown us that PCAP programs are successful in a lot of ways.

- Early engagement of pregnant women who use substances has been shown to affect a range of outcomes related to maternal, fetal, and child outcomes, including

improved infant birth weight. (Low birth weight has been linked to various health problems such as learning disabilities, slower growth rates, respiratory difficulties, and delayed development).

- Women who participate in these programs are more likely to keep custody of their child and have higher rates of accessing and completing addictions treatment.
- Children who are involved with their mothers in a comprehensive program of support have been shown to have enhanced developmental outcomes

## WESTLOCK PARENT LINK CENTRE

Supporting the families of Westlock and surrounding communities is the foundation of the Parent Link Centre. The grand opening of the Westlock Parent Centre was May 9, 2007 and we have continued to grow and flourish thanks to the many families we are privileged to support. The fantastic people we serve, and the amazing volunteers providing some much needed man-power, have allowed us to become a safe, consistent resource for parents. Creating connections has been a priority for Parent Link – with families and between families – in our close-knit community. It encourages relationships within households, and with other service providers, to build confidence in caregiver skills and the confidence to reach out when in need of support.

Effective March 31, 2020, the funding supporting Parent Link Centres across Alberta changed thereby closing the centres. Although we will miss our Parent Link Centre, we can look forward to Westlock Family Connections, in Westlock and Westlock County, delivering caregiver education and programs focusing on child development, asset building, parenting, and strengthening family bonds.

## PEMBINA GATEWAY PARENT LINK NETWORK

Healthy Families Healthy Futures became the lead agent for the Pembina Gateway Parent Link Network (PGPLN) on April 1, 2013, providing fiscal management, as well as supervision of the Program Lead. The Network consisted of seven sites in the North Central Zone – Barrhead, Lac Ste. Anne County, Mayerthorpe, Swan Hills, Thorhild, Westlock, and Whitecourt. Smoky Lake joined the Network in 2015.

PGPLN was developed to provide effective supports, training, and resources to PLC staff who work with families. Data was collected and outcomes were reported at both regional and provincial levels.

The Pembina Gateway Parent Link Network is proud to have served the communities in our region for past 13 years. These Parent Link Centres have become cornerstones in each of their respective locations, providing opportunities for early childhood development programs and parent education to support healthy growth for

families. The community relationships are strong and the connections are deep, strengthening the overall capacity for resilience.

Due to a shift in government funding, the Pembina Gateway Parent Link Network was dissolved effective March 31, 2020. Even with this loss in our communities, we look to optimize our strategies to serve the families in our region.

Healthy Families Healthy Futures would like to thank our formal PGPLN partners – Family and Community Support Services in Barrhead, Lac Ste. Anne County, Mayerthorpe, Smoky Lake, Swan Hills, Thorhild, and Whitecourt. In addition, we've been humbled by the opportunity to work with the Network Lead, Anita Fagnan, who's leadership, passion, and extensive knowledge are rooted in the belief that we can make a difference. Her ability to bring people together, and to share the Network's vision, had a positive impact on our rural communities and families.

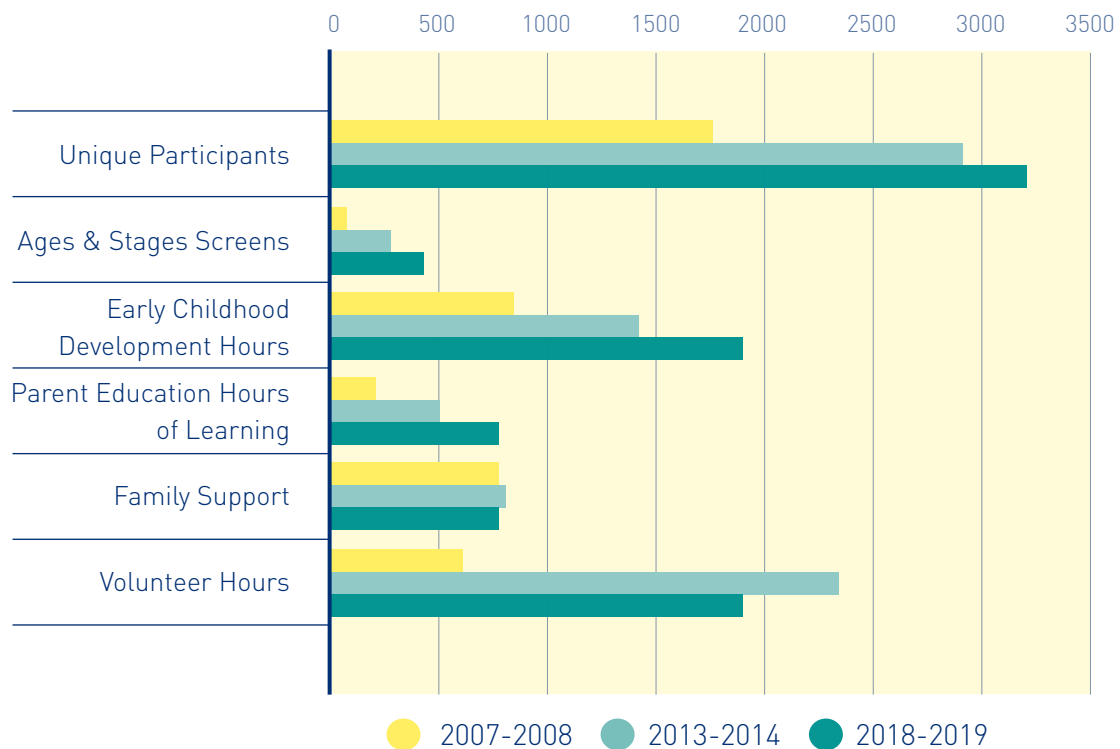

## THRIVE PROGRAM

Healthy Families Healthy Futures secured funding in 2009 to provide outreach services to individuals experiencing relationship abuse in Athabasca and the surrounding area. The Thrive program initiated services to cope with trauma, restore self-esteem, and take steps towards increased safety and well-being for our clients.

Services expanded to Westlock in 2016 allowing us to build the capacity of another community through outreach, educational opportunities, and awareness campaigns.

Thrive Outreach mentors support individuals impacted by abusive relationships by meeting one-on-one to evaluate personal safety, create safety plans, provide emotional, court, and referral support, and work with clients to identify and attain individualized goals for themselves and their families. They also work in the community to increase awareness and decrease the stigma associated with family violence, relationship and elder abuse. They actively work within school and youth serving organizations to promote healthy relationships.

### WALK A MILE IN HER SHOES®

Once again, the community of Athabasca supported the fundraising efforts of The Prevention of Relationship Abuse Action Committee's (PRAAC) annual Walk a Mile in Her Shoes® event. \$24,000 was raised directly impacting the continuation of Thrive services in the community. Thank you Athabasca!

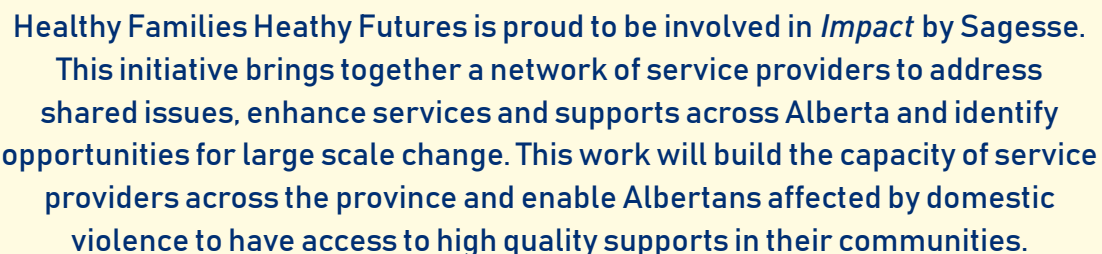

# Social Return On Investment (SROI) Community Action for Healthy Relationships (CAHR) Network

## Valuing Change: Social Return on Investment

Social Return on Investment (SROI) analysis was used to capture the social value of the outcomes produced by the investment in the CAHR network. Through SROI analysis, the outcomes of the program were carefully mapped to the program data collected as part of the program evaluation enabling a clear understanding of the links between the activities of the program and the *change* resulting from these activities. Using a conservative approach, the administrative data, in combination with the program evaluation results, helped to formulate the social value created by the CAHR network within the three communities of Athabasca, Barrhead and Westlock.

## Social Value Created by CAHR Network

Evaluation results indicated that the needs of families living in these three rural communities are being met and in addition, there is a significant amount of social value afforded to the communities involved as well as to the broader region. **The social value of the CAHR network is \$12 for \$1 invested.** This SROI case study demonstrates that CAHR programs don't actually cost because they pay back more than the investment.

## Moving Forward

Sustainable funding is imperative. Without funding, CAHR programs will not be available and individuals and families will no longer have access to relevant and much needed services. The results of the SROI clearly indicate the positive influence our programs have in the lives of those impacted by relationship abuse. Knowing that each **\$1 has a social value of \$12** this meaningful work is relevant and a good investment in the individuals, families, and communities we serve. Our hope is to continue to break down barriers, increase individual, family, and community safety, and provide opportunities to generate awareness and prevention in our rural communities.

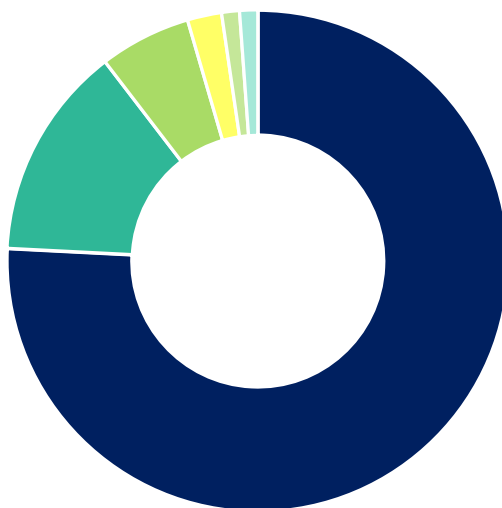

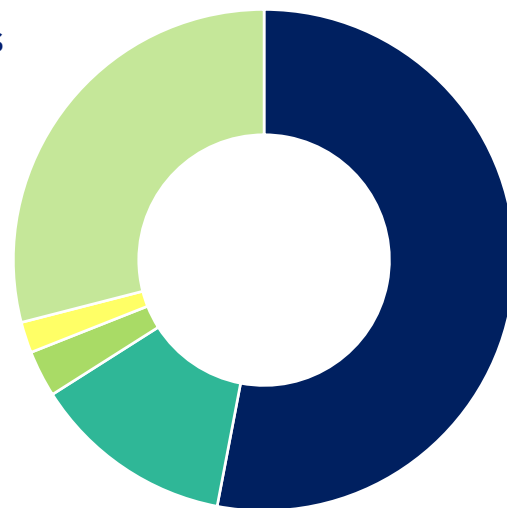
